GOOD NEWS: The Homeless Stranger

The weather had turned and although the sun was still bright, the thin, high clouds were racing across the pale blue sky, mirroring the strong wind that was cutting through his thin coat.

He had no money and owned nothing but the dusty threadbare clothes he wore and the sandals on his feet. The wind threw grit into his eyes and caused him to turn his head slightly down and to one side as he trudged on.

The last town he had been in had not been friendly to him. Some people were just simply frightened when they saw him trudging into their safe little prosperous communities. Was it his presence that made them feel so threatened? How could such an obvious poor and powerless man make them react that way? He smiled to himself, thinking about how his life had panned out.

His state of homelessness was not new to him. He had been born homeless and had spent his earliest years as a stateless refugee. His good and loving parents had struggled to make him a home and settled down, yes, things had gone well for a good few years. As a young man he had gained a trade and helped to run the family business. But that was all behind him now.

The strap on one of his sandals was coming loose again, and as he stopped to adjust it for the umpteenth time that day, he felt his stomach rumble. It would be good to stop somewhere and, perhaps, get something to eat and drink. In the last few years he had always been like this—always, dependent on the goodwill of others for shelter, food and clothing. He smiled as he reflected on the wonderful generosity most people showed him.

Looking up from his sandal, he realized that he was not far from where he was aiming to spend the night, and as he passed over the brow of the hill, he could see the small village in the bottom of the valley. Even from here he could recognize some of the people gathering in the small clearing by the well. Friends he had grown to know during his years on the road were there with others who looked familiar.

The loose sandal caused him to limp a little as he took the steep path down the side of the hill, and the wind that had been troubling him began to buffet him with renewed force. Despite these and the ache in his belly, he smiled. A little boy from the village saw him and trotted up the hill to take a look at this travel-worn, hobbling tramp.

In the village one of the elders looked at him as he approached this small gathering and stood up as if to tell him to move on. His scowl turned to surprise as a man in the crowd stood up and called to the tramp.

‘Jesus, Master. Please we have a seat for you here, out of the wind. The people are eager to hear you speak.’ then, as he gestured to the seat, another brought a drink and Jesus sat within the circle, ready to share his good news with these people.

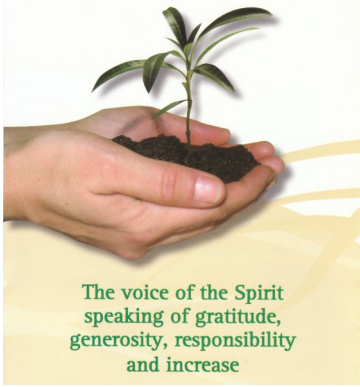

THE CALL – THE DISCIPLE’S VOCATION

The vocations of all Christians do have elements in common. One of these is the call to be a disciple. In fact, we might say that to be disciples – to follow Christ and try to live His life as our own – is the common vocation of Christians; discipleship in this sense is Christian life.

Stewardship – A Disciple’s Response. A Pastoral Letter on Stewardship.

What are you looking for? Jesus asks (two of John’s disciples). Rabbi, they say, Where are you staying? Come and you will see. They spend the day with him, enthralled by his words and by the power of his personality . . . The next day, encountering Philip, Jesus says ‘Follow Me.’ (See John 1:35-50.)

I realized that when my parents and my family, my teachers and my mentors, my pastor and my parish leaders, were calling me to do better, to share my gifts with others, to live as Christ lived, it was actually God calling me through all these people. I was being constantly called and constantly challenged to follow Christ in big and small ways. But this realization helped me to feel joyful about what had earlier seemed burdensome and difficult. I was being called just like James and John, Peter and Andrew, Mary and Martha, Paul, St. Francis, and Mother Teresa!

Questions:

Have you ever heard/felt ‘the call’ of Jesus?

What was happening when you heard it?

How did you know it was Jesus’ calling?

How did you respond?

When we begin with the far greater challenge of being a disciple of Jesus, stewardship becomes a response that is part and parcel of who we are and what we believe. Stewardship formation and education must begin with a radical call to be disciples of Jesus.
