GOOD NEWS: Things aren't always as they appear.

Everybody got off the plane except one lady who was blind. The man had noticed her as he walked by and could tell the lady was blind because her Seeing Eye dog lay quietly underneath the seats in front of her throughout the entire flight. He could also tell she had flown this very flight before because the pilot approached her, and calling her by name, said, "Kitty, we are in Sacramento for almost an hour. Would you like to get off and stretch your legs?" The blind lady replied, "No thanks, but maybe my dog would like to stretch his legs".

All the people in the gate area came to a complete standstill when they looked up and saw the pilot walk off the plane with a Seeing Eye dog! The pilot was even wearing sunglasses.

People scattered.

They not only tried to change planes, but they were trying to change airlines!



Today's Gospel portrays two people standing before God, One who is self-centered and the other who is centered in self. There is a vast difference between the two. The Self-centered has an inflated ego. He is perfect not like those he has to share his life with. Perfection is something he prides himself for.

The other man who is centered-in-self knows what he truly is and is willing to admit to the God who made him and knows his inmost thoughts. He admits that he is a sinner at heart.

It is important that we get to know ourselves and possibly recognize how people see us. Perfection is in God alone, we are all striving to be different, to draw closer to God. Without his help, we have no prospect of success.

Being judgmental is a human trait, looking at others through our jaundiced eyes can give us a distorted view. What most of us require is a bit of eye surgery, performed by the Holy spirit. He has been promised to reveal to us the truth. That includes of course the truth about ourselves, which we often hide from.

Putting on a face for those around us, is a dangerous practice, because we might even begin to believe it ourselves. Jesus is the Light of the World, and it is only when we allow him to light up the dark areas of our life, that we can begin to change. Our aim should be to present a view to others saying: what you see is what you get, this is truly me.

Lord, give the courage to see myself as others see me.

Give me the desire to be as you want me to be

And give the strength for you to change me through your Holy Spirit.

Confession: The Sacrament of Reconciliation. Possibly one of the reasons for the low response for the sacramental preparation, is that the majority of adults do not make use of this Sacrament. The reconciliation rite at the beginning of each Eucharist, deals with what we call venial sins. That does not mean that the going to 'Confession' has lost its place.

From time to time it is good to take stock and approach this sacrament, even if we have not committed a grave or mortal sin. How are we really with God and neighbour is an important assessment for us to make. Sometimes in looking at what acts make us keep asking God for his forgiveness can reveal the real sin that lies behind our sinning. With the help of God and the priest in the sacrament of Reconciliation, we can begin to tackle our waywardness and hopefully sin less. In the same way.

On Going Faith Education. Recently I attended a meeting with some of the people responsible for the RCIA in the parishes of St Mary's Ipswich, Booval and here in St Francis Xavier's. During the Advent period on Wednesdays, there will be the opportunity for parishioners to join in with those preparing for entry into the Catholic Church, for a series of talks.

Here in St Francis Xavier, there will be the opportunity for parishioners to join with the candidates enrolled in the RCIA and their sponsors for fortnightly meetings in the parish.

We never stop learning about our faith, the Church is changing as a living being, There is a wealth of wisdom in past practices and many challenges facing our Church at this time. Make a date in your diary, watch out for detail in further newsletters.



LIVING AS A STEWARD – REDEMPTION AND STEWARDSHIP

Jesus’ disciples share in his priestly work, called to offer up the world and all that is in it – especially themselves – to the Lord of all. In exercising this office, they most fully realize the meaning of our Christian stewardship. *A Disciple’s Response. A Pastoral Letter on Stewardship.*

Now I rejoice in what I am giving up for your sake, and in my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ on behalf of his body, which is the church. Colossians 1:24



All of us are stewards – Christ just asks us to examine to what extent are we practicing stewardship? One reason for our practice of stewardship is to help bring about redemption – not just ours, but the rest of the world too.

This stewardship to help bring about redemption, can often be through the use of our time: including setting aside time for prayer, scripture, adoration, worship. But it can also be through our suffering. We’ll never understand why we suffer, but our stewardship means that we try to find Christ even in pain, deprivation, and loss. The knowledge that we’ll never completely understand it, but that we will strive toward that understanding anyway, reminds us again that Stewardship is also a journey that we must continue to make, even though we’ll never get to the end.

Question:

How does redemption relate to stewardship?

Knowing what we believe and why then prompts us to live out our faith spiritually in the world today. At times, the cost involved in doing this is high. But we are asked to pay that price in trying to incarnate the values of the Gospel and the teachings of the Church today. *Archbishop Thomas Murphy*
