Good News: The KingdomAnother Way.

Jesus had a dream for our world; he called it the kingdom of heaven. He dreamt of life on earth being a mirror of heaven. Towards the realization of this dream he began to tell people that there is another way.

Instead of the nightmare of war, he spoke of brothers and sisters in the one family of God.

Instead of bitterness and retaliation, he spoke of love that refuses to be poisoned and makes one pray for the oppressor. In place of the scepter of famine which will always haunt a greedy, grasping world, he set up the practical criterion of how we feed the hungry and clothe the naked.

In place of the murky world of deeds of darkness, Jesus wanted all of life to be a clear reflection of the light of heaven. He prayed that the will of the Father be done on earth as it is in heaven. Where God's will holds sway, there is where God is king. And that is the kingdom of heaven on earth.

In Matthew's understanding (and he is our evangelist for the rest of this year), the work of Jesus was to set up the kingdom of heaven upon earth. Matthew describes it as a work progressing in five stages.

First he announced that the kingdom was close at hand. Then he travelled with the words of good news and deeds of mercy. He lit a beacon on the height of the mountain where he preached the charter of life for the kingdom.

In the second stage he worked closely with selected disciples, the nucleus of the church, who would give legs to the message for the spread of the kingdom.

In the next stage he spoke mainly in parables to prepare them for the pains and struggles of slow growth, disappointments and opposition.

After that he worked again with the disciples, organized them under Peter and instructed them at greater depth about the way.

Finally, he spoke of the glorious future of the kingdom when he would come again in glory.

So, when Jesus began to tell the people that there is another way, his first words were about letting go of the old sinful way of life. Repent ... let the old hatred go ... put on a new mind ... enter a new system of values .. Be born again of water and the Holy Spirit.

The message of the kingdom was a call to revolution. Minds would have to turn the full circle. Accepted values and standards were turned upside down. the greatest in the kingdom would not be the one who receives the most but the one who gives the most. The richest in the kingdom would not be those who possessed most but those who had the greatest emptiness for God. The voice that would be greatest would not be the loudest or most commanding but the whisper of those who go to the inner room and pray to God in the secret recess of the heart,

In the kingdom the first shall be last and the last shall be first.

Jesus began to preach his dream. There is another way. The world is meant to be a mirror of God's love ... the kingdom of heaven on earth,

To realise this dream we must let worldly values be turned upside down. We must repent.



RCIA - Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults.

This year we have a number of adults who are in the process of joining our church. They have been meeting for a considerable time up to now. Each Wednesday, they have joined other candidates from the parishes of Booval and Ipswich to be instructed in the faith.

Some of our parishioners have agreed to act as sponsors for the candidates and they too have attended the sessions.

The process of RCIA has a good history here in St Francis Xavier's, as when it was introduced, the parish was one of the pilot parishes in the Archdiocese.

We are always on the lookout for people to help with the process of introducing new members to the Church.

The guidelines make it clear that the RCIA process is not about a small group separate to the parish, but is in fact the whole parish working together.

The following article has been prepared by a member of the RCIA Team from St Mary's in Ipswich.

Parish involvement in Baptisms

Something which is not always recognised is that the Sacrament of Baptism was not originally a private ceremony. It is actually meant to be celebrated within the full worshipping community of the faithful, usually associated with Eucharist.

These days, infant Baptism is normally performed as a predominantly private family affair, although many parishes try to have representatives of the broader parish community present to provide support for the newly-baptised. Adult Baptisms are more commonly celebrated through the RCIA at Easter Eucharist, however this should be the norm, not the exception.

The other aspect to this is that it is not just the actual celebration of the Sacrament that should involve the whole community, but the candidate's formation and preparation for the Sacrament.

By virtue of our own Baptism, we are all obligated to spread the Gospel message and to bring others to the full realisation of God's mission through his Church.

The Introduction to the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults includes a statement that *'The initiation of catechumens is a gradual process that takes place within the community of the faithful... The faithful should remember that for the Church and its members the supreme purpose of the apostolate is that Christ's message is made known to the world by word and deed and that his grace is communicated. They should therefore show themselves ready to give the candidates evidence of the spirit of the Christian community and to welcome them into their homes, into personal conversation, and into community gatherings.'*

It is not the responsibility of just the priest and a few helpers to bring new members into the Church, it is the responsibility of us all to provide support through prayer and action.
