The Ascension Of The Lord

GOOD NEWS: *A Mountain in Galilee*

“Great things happen when men and mountains meet.”

I am not sure who wrote the line but Matthew would like it. Matthew wrote of five mountains: just as his book is composed of five parts in imitation of the five books of the law, the Pentateuch.

The first mountain (*Mt 5:1*) was the elevated scene of the great sermon in which Jesus set out his overview of the kingdom: of what life on earth could be like if the rule of God were taken Seriously.

The second mountain was where Jesus went by himself to pray. (*14:23*) Even Jesus needed to withdraw from the pressures of the crowd. The mountain of prayer represents withdrawing to solitude and climbing up above the pressing throng to a place of perspective. Prayer needs solitude and perspective of the mountain.

The third mountain (*15:29*) was the scene of many healings. The crowd was astonished and they ‘praised the God of Israel.’

The fourth mountain, we are told was high (*17:1*) Up there he took Peter and James and John where they could be alone. The deep religious experiences of Moses on Mount Sinai (*Ex 24*) and of Elijah on Mount Horeb (*1 Kings 19*) were relived when the face of Jesus shone like the sun and he was transfigured.

The fifth mountain was in Galilee. The apostles were instructed to go there by the angel who spoke to the women at the empty tomb. Here took place the final meeting of the risen Lord with the disciples. The meeting offered full confirmation of two aspects of the Easter message: the glorification of Jesus Christ; and the continuation of his message through the disciples.

When the disciples saw Jesus they fell down before him. They adored him, as the Magi had adored the Infant King. Yet there was a certain hesitation in their adoration: this expresses the mixture of light and darkness in faith. Throughout Matthew, the mixture of good and bad, of strong and weak in the church, is a recurring theme.

The gap between the God of glory and our limited condition can only be bridged by the initiative and approach of God. That is why Jesus ‘came up’ to them, just as he had approached the three prostrate apostles on the mount of the transfiguration.

He spoke of his glorification in words that recalled a vision of the prophet Daniel: “All authority in heaven and on earth has been give to me.”

Matthew does not give us Luke’s more physical picture of Jesus rising up towards the skies. What Matthew conveys is the universal, cosmic authority of Christ. This is the authority that St Paul expresses in today’s second reading. ‘He has put all things under his feet, made him the ruler of everything, the head of the Church; which is his body, the fullness of him who fills the whole creation.’ (Eph 1:22-23)

After this confirmation of the glory and authority to Jesus Christ, the second aspect of Easter life to be confirmed is the continuing presence of the Lord through the mission of the church community.

In the course of his gospel Matthew wrote of how Jesus proclaimed the ideal of the kingdom and worked closely with the selected disciples to make them ministers of the kingdom. The church would be the means of the kingdom throughout the world.

The ministry of Jesus was confined to Jewish territory; but the mission of the church community would be to all nations. That is why the final mountain of meeting is in ‘Galilee of the nations’. From there the disciples are sent out to proclaim his kingdom to all peoples, to baptize in the name of the three Divine Persons, and to teach the way of the commandments.

They would never be alone. He, the risen Lord, would be with them always to the end of time.

Matthew’s first news of Jesus was the annunciation to Joseph of the birth of the one who would be Emmanuel, God-with- us.

And the his last word is again of God-with-us.

Peter was moved to say to Him ‘We have put aside everything to follow you!’ Jesus answered, ‘I give you my word, there is no one who has given up home, brothers or sisters, mother or father, children or property, for me and for the gospel who will not receive in this present age a hundred times as many homes, brothers and sisters, mothers, children and property – and prosecution besides – and in the age to come, everlasting life.’ (Mark 10: 28-30)

I am constantly in awe of the seeming paradoxes that run through Christ's message (I think that is why it rings so true – who would preach a message so contrary to the ways of this world but God himself?).

The more we give up for God (to the church and community, of time and treasure), the more we receive from God! And not just in the next life, but in this life too.

I've found my friends who practice Stewardship as a way of life say they have found the meaning and purpose of life: serving others and giving of themselves. They are the happiest and most fulfilled people I know (certainly more so than those who've focused on getting as many material goods & toys as they can).

Questions:

Why should we do good here in this life?

What should you do best in God's kingdom on earth to prepare yourself for God's kingdom in heaven?

Thank God our time is now! Stewardship is an enterprise that invites us into an exploration of a new world – an exploration into God. Which one of us can dare resist this incredible invitation from a loving and gracious God? *Archbishop Thomas Murphy*
