**Good News:** The Lord, ascended on high, keeps watch over the Church's boat throughout the storms. His message is always one of courage. And our experience of terror can open us up to a greater sense of God.

This story of the boat in the storm leads to an awesome sense of the nearness of God. Peter calls Jesus 'Lord' and the men in the boat bowed down before him and said, 'Truly, you are the Son of God.' It is a story of faith that develops into adoration. If you have ever experienced the need to cast yourself down in adoration of God, you have been blessed with a very precious divine encounter.

The gospels are based on the experiences of people in their encounters with God in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. These experiences were treasured in memory and retold. The growing Christian Community remembered and recalled these experiences for their own edification and strengthening. Matthew has brilliantly reconstructed the memory of the boat in the storm as an instruction for his contemporaries on how faith can develop through the storms of life.

Where is Jesus now? According to the story he has gone up to the hills to pray. This is the second of the five mountains in Matthew. It is the mountain of prayer and sets the context for the deep experience of God's greatness and nearness. The mountain of prayer anticipates the ascension of the glorified Lord. He is no longer here to be physically seen or heard, or touched, but his care for his flock is unceasing, for in heaven he is 'living for ever to interceded for all who come to God through him.' (Heb 7:25)

The boat of the disciples is surely the Church caught up in the teeth of a particularly violent storm.

It is night-time: for the journey of the church is by the dim light of faith. No longer have they the physical, tangible nearness of Jesus. They are just learning that his care extends through the night. They are to trust that the glorified Lord will come again, though not until the final watch of the night. Until then we chart our course by faith.

Faith is a mysterious balance of light and darkness, the mixture of the absence of God and his presence. The believer steps out into the darkness beyond the light of reasoning and scientific proof. God is not known in the same way that we know one another through contact with the outer senses. We are peering through the night.

St Paul compared it to the imperfect reflection shown in the dull plate-mirror of his day: 'Now we are seeing a dim reflection in a mirror, but then we shall be seeing face to face. The knowledge that I have now is imperfect.' (1 Cor 13:12)

The disciples did have faith, but it was still only little faith, baby faith which would have to grow. Peter emerges as their spokesman. He has faith enough to venture beyond what was sensible. He walked on water. But he did not have faith enough to persevere in the face of wind and mounting waves.

'Man of little faith, why did you doubt?' Grown-up faith faces the problems and still does not doubt. It may be very unclear (for it peers through the darkness), but it does not doubt. Its strength comes from hearing the Word: 'Courage! It is I! Do not be afraid.'

The mature believer has this immovable foundation that God is, and God cares for us, and God is watching us through the night and through the storm. The storm can be good for deepening our faith.

In the story of Elijah on the mountain 'the Lord himself went by.' God was there all the time but Elijah did not experience him in the great storm, nor the earthquake, nor the fire. It was only after these times of terror that Elijah experienced the presence of God in the gentle breeze. He stood in awe at the entrance to his cave and covered his face.

Similarly with the disciples in the boat, it was when the storm subsided that they bowed down and said: 'Truly, you are the Son of God.' It took the storm which showed up their own helplessness to reveal the greatness of Jesus to them. Their humiliation prepared them for adoration.

The story is about the little faith that can grow and become adoration.

**P**eter was moved to say to Him ‘We have put aside everything to follow you!’ Jesus answered, ‘I give you my word, there is no one who has given up home, brothers or sisters, mother or father, children or property, for me and for the gospel who will not receive in this present age a hundred times as many homes, brothers and sisters, mothers, children and property – and prosecution besides – and in the age to come, everlasting life.’

(Mark 10: 28-30)

I am constantly in awe of the seeming paradoxes that run through Christ’s message (I think that is why it rings so true – who would preach a message so contrary to the ways of this world but God himself?).

The more we give up for God (to the church and community, of time and treasure), the more we receive from God! And not just in the next life, but in this life too.

I’ve found my friends who practice Stewardship as a way of life say they have found the meaning and purpose of life: serving others and giving of themselves. They are the happiest and most fulfilled people I know (certainly more so than those who’ve focused on getting as many material goods & toys as they can).

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### Questions:

Why should we do good here in this life?

What should you do best in God’s kingdom on earth to prepare yourself for God’s kingdom in heaven?

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Thank God our time is now! Stewardship is an enterprise that invites us into an exploration of a new world – an exploration into God.
