GOOD NEWS: Anger or apathy?

In the country and time of when Jesus lived, people took religious claims so seriously that an issue would provoke extreme anger and resort to violence: even the unlimited violence of killing.

The Jewish leaders liked to consider themselves as God's chosen vineyard. Jesus used their own favourite image in an appeal to open their eyes to what they were doing. He could see the inevitable eruption of violence. The story he told them was full of violence.

An important point in the story of the vineyard is the ambition of the tenants to gain control of the ownership of the vineyard. If a landowner died intestate, ownership would pass on to the tenants. That explains why they killed the son of the landowner. Jesus confronted the leaders with the unpleasant news that they were trying to take over God's place rather than work in his service. It will always be a temptation to any strong religious group or individual to become so self-righteous in their calling that eventually they appropriate God's position.

They begin to think and act as if they were God. They claim divine rights over people's minds ... and lives ... eventually claiming the right to kill others. By contrast, Jesus let himself be taken and killed.

If Jesus were to walk the roads and preach the kingdom in our time and culture, would he provoke the same anger and opposition? Would he be criminalized today? Would he suffer the equivalent of crucifixion? In our typical western (or more precisely, northern) culture, I doubt if he would arouse too much opposition. He would meet with far more apathy and indifference from the ranks of post-Christian secularism.

He would be highlighted as a curiosity for a people whose deepest struggle is with boredom. Admired as an idealist, but utterly naïve. He would be invited to the weekend TV chat show, asked questions ranging from the trivial to the most serious, thanked and asked to move over for the next act before the commercial break. The serious business of diversion would continue.

The startling fact is that the Son of God came to earth and was rejected! 'He came unto his own and his own received him not.' (*Jn 1:11*) Once, the rejection was in anger and violence: today, it is in apathy and indifference.

Anger or apathy? Which is worse?

The truth is that either is bad.

Whether in anger or apathy, the terrible truth is that we reject him in so many ways.

Apathy seems to be the current means of response to religious matters. The conflict between the world and the kingdom of God is real. Attacks on the teaching of the Church and those who profess it as true are real and frequent. Because people speak out against the minority, they are labelled as being out of touch or even homophobic. Within the Church, a small minority are challenging the Pope and his recent teaching. It is so easy as Silvester has pointed out to take the high-ground and result in violence towards those who do not hold our view. Jesus said 'turn the other cheek', 'pray for your enemies', 'do all in love'.

Prayer is also a great remedy in turning the tables on those who are attacking. Don't try to change them yourselves, ask God to touch their hearts and ask God to change them. He can!

Family Mass On the first Sunday in November, the 9.00am Mass will be celebrated in the School Hall and families of children attending St Francis Xavier School will be invited to take part. The last hymn of the Mass is one that the children know, but we have not used. On the two Sunday leading up to November, we will practice the new hymn at all masses using a CD.

First Holy communion Medals are available from the sacristy. Please collect your medal and mark off the sheet.

Parking Spaces in the Car Park. Just a gentle reminder that the spaces in the Car park should be used for parishioners attending Mass on weekends. The Kindy Car Park is not available for parishioners during weekday. For week-days, please use the Area marked PARISH PARKING ONLY. Up to 8.30 during term time, the spaces in the main car-park are for school and parish staff, after 8.30 they are open to all. Finally please do not park on the grassed areas.

Replacement of the Church Roof. At long last, the final step in the process of replacing the church Roof has been completed. We have permission from the Heritage commission and have negotiated a loan from the Archdiocesan Development Fund. The roofing company has been informed and we await the details of when they will begin the work.

New Roster for Ministers. Ministers can collect the new minister's Roster from the Sacristy. A number of parishioners who attended the last training session and have received their Positive Blue Card Notice are included in the new roster. Please remember that it is the responsibility of the minister to find a replacement if they are unable to meet a commitment.

We are still looking to supplement the minister's roster for weekend Masses. Since our last training session, a couple of people have expressed an interest. If you are considering becoming a Minister of the Word or a Communion Minister, please let Father Roger or the Parish Office know. As soon as we have a reasonable number of people interested, a training session will be arranged.

CELEBRATING 100 YEARS OF FATIMA October 13th this year marks the centenary of the last apparition of Our Lady at Fatima and the Miracle of the Sun. You are invited to make a pilgrimage to our Cathedral for a CANDLELIT ROSARY PROCESSION on the evening of Saturday, October 14th. 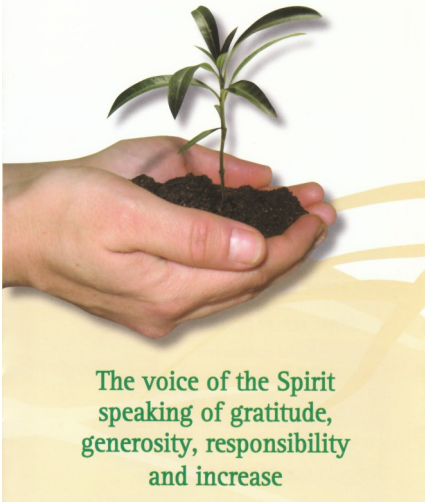

Stewardship – A Disciple’s Response. A Pastoral Letter on Stewardship

G*o out to the whole world and proclaim the Gospel to every creature. Mark 16:15*

I realized that evangelization is not just something that someone else in a far off land does. It isn’t something that people on television do on Sunday morning. It is something that we do each day! How do we do it? Entirely in how we live our lives. I heard somewhere that many people decide to become Catholic as a result of seeing how their Catholic friends live their lives. And the choices we make in the market place (what we watch on TV, the books and magazines we buy) also determine what images – positive or negative, wholesome or destructive, supportive of a Christian lifestyle or ambivalent - go out to society.

Questions

How am I passing on the faith to my loved ones and friends and neighbors?

How might I do this better?

How do I help and support Church efforts to spread the message of Jesus?

There is an inbred connection between stewardship and evangelization. A connection where, if we have the gift of faith, Stewardship calls us to proclaim it and to share it. Which is what evangelization is all about. *Archbishop Thomas Murphy*
