Feast of the Holy Family

In Matthew's stories surrounding Jesus' birth the human suffering caused by Herod's cruelty appalls and saddens. However, the full impact of the story comes to us in this sublime proclamation in the Gospel of John: "The Word became flesh and dwelt amongst us." Jesus, we hear, is indeed Emmanuel, God-with-us. So it is God-with-us who in Matthew's story escapes death by flight from Herod's insecure but brutal power, banished to share his human ancestors' bitter experience of exile. In the beginning, as at the end, the 'kingdom of this world' had no room for Emmanuel.

Today, the bitter experience of exile is shared by millions of refugees in flight from the loss or abuse of their human dignity and rights. Their very lives are at the mercy of prosperous nations who control and enjoy so much of the world's God-given resources. Why are so many of them knocking in vain at the doors of nations claiming to honour human

rights? Or nations whose cultural heritage has been shaped in part by the Christian ideal: "love the Lord your God ... and love your neighbour as yourself"?

In my prosperous country, fear of 'other' seems to have hardened into an attitude which regards any group that may disturb our comfortable status quo as a threat, a potential burden, an enemy to be kept at bay. Directed to refugees, such an attitude breeds indifference to both their suffering and their rights and condones policies of self-interested exclusion, short-sightedly claimed to be 'in the national interest'.

Are we, in sa strange paradox, in flight from the refugee whose plight challenges us to be truly human? For the Christian the challenge cuts even deeper. If in flight from our human brothers and sisters in dire need, are we not in flight from Emmanuel, God-with-us? 'As often as you did it to one of these, you did it to me' (Matthew 25:40).

In sharp contrast to national policy of 2004, a public sign outside a parish school in Sydney proclaimed that Gospel message: 'We welcome Christ who comes to us in the refugee.'

How Will You Celebrate the Jubilee?

Pope Francis asks each of us to celebrate by showing to others the mercy that God constantly extends to all of us. Here are a few things you can do:

- **Contemplate Mercy.** The motto for the jubilee year is “Merciful like the Father.” By contemplating mercy, we begin to see how God gives himself to us and asks us nothing in return. Because we are touched by God’s mercy, we can be merciful toward others.
- **Don’t Judge or Condemn.** No one can look into another person’s soul. We see only what happens on the surface. Refraining from judgment and condemnation is an act of mercy, because it allows us to accept the good in every person and spare that person suffering caused by our negative attitudes.
- **Forgive.** Jesus asks us to forgive others in the same way that we have received forgiveness from God. When we forgive we release the poison of resentment that builds up inside of us. Forgiveness is an act of mercy for ourselves as well as the person who hurt us.
- **Listen to God’s Word.** To become more merciful we must listen to the Word of God in Scripture and meditate on the message of God’s mercy. As we grow in our understanding of mercy, we can better incorporate mercy into our lives.
- **Go on a Pilgrimage.** Pope Francis hopes that we will make a pilgrimage to a Holy door in Rome or in our Archdiocese, where we can receive special graces granted during the Jubilee year.
- **Recognise the Need for Mercy.** During the Jubilee year, we are called to recognise human misery in our world and reach out to those in need of mercy. We must find ways to heal wounds, break down barriers of indifference, offer friendship, and restore human dignity.
- **Practice the Spiritual and Corporal Acts of Mercy.** We practice the corporal works of mercy when we feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, welcome the strangers, heal the sick, visit the imprisoned, and bury the dead. We practice the spiritual works of mercy when we counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, admonish the sinners, comfort the afflicted, forgive offences, bear patiently those who do us ill, and pray for the living and the dead.
- **Change our Hearts.** The ultimate goal of the Year of Mercy is to help us change our hearts and our lives so we can become conduits of God’s mercy in everything that we say and do.

The Call – The Call of Stewardship

Following Jesus is the work of a lifetime. At every step forward, one is challenged to go further in accepting and loving God’s will. Being a disciple is not just something else to do . . . it is a total way of life and requires continuing conversion. – *A Disciple’s Response. A Pastoral Letter on Stewardship*

As Vatican II remarks, all Christians are “bound to show forth, by the example of their lives and by the witness of their speech,” that new life of faith which begins in baptism and is strengthened by the power of the Holy Spirit in confirmation.” (Ad Gentes, 11)

There is a woman I know who I see receiving communion at Mass every week. She positively glows! I didn’t know who she was, so I asked a fellow parishioner about her. While she has all the ‘attributes’ of our lives – a family, a job, a mortgage – my fellow parishioner told me she has stripped her life of all unnecessary encumbrances.

Though prosperous, she doesn’t work to get rich, she works to make a living and because she has found a job she likes. Though involved in our parish and the community, she doesn’t do it for public acclaim, but because she cares about helping others. Though she is a boss at work, a parent and spouse at home, an elder sister in her family, her direction of those for whom she has responsibility is merely to share wisdom, provide guidance, and support others.

She has found happiness in the ultimate paradoxes: that totally giving over control of one’s life to God is the truest liberation, that giving up your life brings eternal life!

Questions:

How is stewardship a part of being a disciple?

What does it mean to you to be a steward of the Church?

Do you see your baptism as creating a responsibility to follow Jesus?

Stewardship means I am not in control. It means the gifts I take for granted will not always be mine. It means that when it comes down to the basic gifts of life, love, faith, and relationships, what I possess and who I am makes little or no difference. *Archbishop Thomas Murphy.*
